Five years ago, a small group of solution-minded Massachusetts manufacturers and industry leaders compared notes about various business challenges each was facing. While their production needs were diverse and their products couldn't have been more different, they all quickly realized that their workforce struggles were very similar.

Already feeling the effects of a rapidly growing skills gap and determined to affect change, this group of "manufacturing vigilantes" reached out to their peers and partners, steadily increasing in both size and synergy. Before long, this group became known simply as "The MACWIC."

They soon formed the foundation for a skilled workforce pathway certification, specifically designed to increase the number of work-ready candidates with demonstrated competencies in the basic skills manufacturers need most. Today, the MACWIC is a vital workforce development resource for its more than 225 member companies, who combined represent over 27,000 employees and over 20% of all manufacturing revenue in the state.

The Applied Manufacturing Technology Pathway Certification is an advanced manufacturing certification program that serves two main purposes. One is to add value and merit to the industry to encourage individuals to consider careers in manufacturing. The second is to create a standard instruction set and evaluation process (which is continuously improved) so that employers readily understand the skill set of an applicant, therefore reducing the cost of hire.

- Multiple exit points at successively higher levels of family-supporting employment and aligned with subsequent educational entry points
